1.1 Curriculum Planning and Implementation					
1.1.1 Institution has the mechanism for well planned curriculum delivery and documentation. Explain in 500 words					
Since the College is Affiliating Dr. B.R Ambedkar University, Srikakulam, all the Departments are being followed the Syllabus prescribed by the Respective Board of Studies of the University. Most of the Staff members are working as Chairmans and members of different board of studies and participating in the design and development of the curriculum. The common syllabus is prescribed by Andhra Pradesh State Council of Higher Education (APSCHE) for all Universities. The CBCS System is being implemented with cumulative effect comprising six semesters from the Academic year 2015-16 for the 1 st year UG. The Staff members concerned conduct periodical tests and Mid examinations for each Semester in all subjects and the progress of the students is well monitored. Examinations are conducted on the University model to familiarize the students with questions and also to allow them to test their own ability in answering the paper in the stipulated time. The internal system is under practice for 25 marks which consists of Mid examinations, assignments, Student study projects and group discussions. The Semester End examinations are being conducted for 75 marks by the Affiliating university. All the departments arrange Guest Lectures and extension lectures to the students that would make one in a position to know the latest advancement in their respective fields of study. The National/ State level/ Region/ District level workshops and seminars are being organized by various departments periodically as per the needs of updating syllabus for the benefit of both faculty and students. All the staff members submit their academic plans at the beginning of the academic year. The members of the staff present their teaching plans and diaries every month to the Principal. If any staff member fails to cover the syllabus as per the academic plan during the any given period, steps are taken to cover the backlog by conducting extra classes.

The college has a strong and highly reliable student mentoring system. There are totally 57 teachers, and each teacher looks after the mentoring of 20 to 30 students. At the time of the student's admission into the college, each student is given a bio-data form containing the information on the student's family, financial and academic background, interests, hobbies, and future aspirations etc. Accordingly, the student is given guidance by the teacher concerned. Students are given necessary guidance and counseling in academic, curricular and extra-curricular matters and employment opportunities, prospects for further studies etc. Career guidance programmes are arranged for the students to help them plan their future. Stress management					

sessions and motivation sessions are also arranged. Every cautious step is taken to minimize dropout rate to a maximum possible extent. Each mentor maintains the personal record of the wards, monitors their attendance and performance and provides personal guidance to the needy students.

Ward councilors provide counseling to students from time to time depending on the case study details of the students. Abilities, talents, shortcomings of students are recorded.

Professional guidance is given by career guidance and counseling cell and students are informed about latest job notifications, eligibility criteria, syllabus and strategies of preparation etc.

<p>❖ Curriculum Development: The College is affiliated to Dr. B.R. Ambedkar University, Srikakulam, strictly adheres to syllabus prescribed by the University for U.G. and P.G. programmes. However, the university has been assigning lead role to this institution in designing and developing the curriculum as most of the faculty members (45 per cent) are either chairpersons or members in BOS that gives enormous scope to incorporate institutional goals in the curriculum. The institution has freedom to design and develop the curriculum for certificate courses that suit the institutional and local goals. While designing such curriculum, the College gives due priority to the opinions of the experienced faculty and subject experts outside the institution to cover thrust areas like employability, entrepreneurship, knowledge enrichment, intending to equip the students with skills to acquire global competencies. The core committee comprises of Principal, IQAC Coordinator and Academic Coordinator carefully monitors the entire task.</p>
<p>❖ Teaching and Learning: The teaching and learning process in College is student centric and faculty is striving hard to adopt different techniques to facilitate the student involvement in the learning activity. The technology facilities available in the College for effective teaching are LCDs, smart boards, Every department is equipped with Computer with internet. The science departments use virtual laboratories for its practical's. The College adopts various measures to overcome the barriers of learning. Every faculty member is kept in charge of one class for mentoring purpose. The College meticulously plans its academic activities basing on the diversity of learning on basis of their socio-economic background, abilities and skills.</p>
<p>Examination and Evaluation: The impact on Student is that the College stood at one of the three top positions in the university examinations. Library digitalization was done recently and made available to the teachers and students for their learning purposes. As this is Government College, the recruitment of permanent lecturers is done by the Government of Andhra Pradesh through APPSC and DPC. In house training programme was conducted by the IQAC to enrich the curriculum and its documentation. Teachers performance is assessed through structured questionnaire canvassed among students, the information is analyzed by IQAC. Feed back on teacher is taken from the students at regular intervals to assess the teacher's performance. If any fault is found with any teacher, the matter is smoothly dealt by Vice Principal and the teacher is made fit for effective teaching. Open Educational resources are provided through Internet, MANA T.V. This College has adopted CIA (Continues Internal Assessment) In-charge of the Departments which includes selection of independent elective programme by the student of his choice. 50 Percentage of the internal evaluation allocated to CIA for creating enthusiasm and interest among the student community. The College adopts both formative and summative evaluation approaches for assessing the student's excellence. In the CBCS, 25 Percentage marks are allocated for internal evaluation and 75 Percentage for external evaluation. In the formative In-charge of the Departments the marks are given for student's participation in seminars, field trips, assignments, project works, performance in interactive session along</p>

with descriptive mid semesters' Graduate attributes through innovativeness and outreaching programmes such as lab to land, Water harvesting techniques and yoga for physical & mental health. Redressal of grievances on evaluation is possible both at University level and College level. The College has well built mechanism for realization of teaching, learning and assessment strategies to attain the intended learning outcomes.

Research and Development: The IQAC committee takes the responsibility of research committee activities. The committee frequently interacts with the faculty and motivate them to involve in research work. The departments are encouraged to organize seminars/workshops/conferences and they come out with socially relevant suggestions and inculcate research aptitude among students and enlighten them regarding the local thrust areas and social problems through student study projects. The College is now fully internet-abled with Wi-Fi facilities. Faculty members are publishing their research papers in reputed journals frequently. 09 members are pursuing their Ph.D in reputed universities. 01 Major and 04 Minor Research projects were completed with the financial assistance of UGC and 02 Minor Research projects are ongoing. 06 faculty members enthusiastically applied for major & minor research projects and eagerly awaiting the sanction orders.

Library, ICT and Physical Infrastructure / Instrumentation: The College is equipped with adequate infrastructure facilities like well furnished Classrooms, Laboratories, Seminar hall, Library, Botanical garden, Zoology museum, Hostel, Canteen, Management office, Principal's office, Administrative Room, RO Water System and Solar Inverters. There are 23 Lecture halls in the College with standard dimensions. There are 08 departments of science faculty with adequate built up area. There are eight rooms for Humanities & Social Science faculty. The College has set up 12 Smart class rooms with Broad Band connection, LCD for technology based teaching and learning process. One seminar hall, Auditorium, library, physical education department, two rooms for gym and table tennis room, one JKC laboratory and one English language Laboratory. For extracurricular activities there are outdoor and indoor games facility, auditorium, NSS room. Cultural activities are conducted on the open dais of the College at the time of Annual Social Gathering. College provides necessary musical instruments for conducting various cultural activities.

Human Resource Management: The Institution motivates and deposes the teaching staff for refresher courses. Orientation programmes, seminars, retraining programmes, workshops etc. to improve teaching In-charge of the Departments and teaching techniques. Computer skills are provided to Non-teaching staff for effective administration.

Industry Interaction / Collaboration: All the departments of the College conduct field trips and industrial tours. Interaction with industrial people is very helpful to students for their study projects and

exposure. Many of the departments have MOUs with surrounding industries.

Admission of Students: The institution follows transparent admission policy. For Under Graduate admissions, selection of students shall be made on merit in the qualifying examinations and rule of reservation of the Government of Andhra Pradesh. In case of P.G. admissions, the College follows common admission test conducted by the affiliating University. It is evident that 98 per cent of the total students belong to weaker section communities. There is constant demand for admissions. The institution has been facing severe competition from the private organizations as they are offering unrealistic incentives to attract students. The institution is ensuring necessary facilities to the differently abled students for comfortable learning.

6.2.2 : Implementation of e-governance in areas of operations:

Planning and Development : The College Planning and Development Council (CPDC) was constituted as per the instructions of the Government with a view to involve the local public and elite in the developmental activities of the College. It was proposed to meet the local philanthropists who could offer their services to accumulate necessary funds. Meetings of the CPDC were held periodically to discuss and review the progress of the activities taken up department wise.

Administration : The College administration releases funds granted by the funding agencies as and when required by the principal Investigator. Adequate infrastructure is available in the College in the form of Labs, internet facilities, online availability of literature and library facilities. Exemption is given from Examination work during summer vacation to teachers so as to involve in research work. Every year, each department undertakes minimum 5 to 7 student study projects for the last four years. We are thankful to UGC for providing funds to each project ranging from Rs.1,00,000 to Rs. 8,00,000 for all the completed and ongoing research projects. The institution invited number of stalwarts and eminent scholars in their subjects every year.

Finance and Accounts : Every year the College goes through internal audit and stock verification activity and external audit is usually done once in five years. The major sources of finance for Institution are UGC funds, Special fee, Restructured and self financing courses fee, C.P.D.C and Fee reimbursement from Social Welfare Department. UGC grants are utilized, audited and the audited statements are sent to UGC in time. The academic audit is conducted once in a academic year. The institution secured `A` grade in all academic audits done so far. IQAC coordinates between Institution and different stakeholders for quality sustenance and enhancement.

Student Admission and Support : The institution takes all efforts for finding out scholarships, so the needy students can get financial support. As it is a government funded College, 95% of the students belong to SC/ST and OBC students are eligible for scholarships. The scholarship amount is directly deposited in the incumbent bank account/Hostel warden Account. Besides Scholarships, the other provisions are: reservation in admissions, Remedial coaching with UGC/RSC funds, Bus pass concessions, Tuition fee

waiver, Book Bank facility, coaching for entry in to services. Students with physical disabilities get 3 Percentage reservation in admissions, additional time (half an hour time) is given in Examinations, Scribe facility at the time of examinations. Mock and innovative competitions are conducted, and students are sent to district level and state level competitions for both co-curricular and extracurricular activities and they comeback with bagging prizes. The career Guidance cell and library provide books and material to prepare for higher studies and competitive examinations. A special training programme with UGC funds was conducted by the career guidance cell to enable them to appear for various exams like Ed-CET, DSC, AUCET, L.P.CET, Bank exams, etc. College continuously works for the holistic personality development of the students through several capacity building and Skill development (spoken English, computer literacy, programmes. Support for “slow learners” is given in the form of Remedial classes. Personal attention is paid on dull students by the teachers. Institution annually publishes a Magazine for students to realize their creative potential and hone their writing skills. It comprises general as well as articles relating to the subject. Towards empowerment of women students, College conducts short term entrepreneurial skill programmes to facilitate the students to earn their bread where they reside. The College has conducted 11 such programmes during last four years. The College conducts academic counselling, career counselling, and psycho-social counselling through mentoring system.

The Commissionrate of Collegiate Education (CCE) has established a Jawahar Knowledge Centre (JKC) in the institution with a view to enhance employable skills to the under graduate students in 2006. It provides placement to those students through campus drives. About 1012 students were trained for the last four years and 201 have got placements in various agencies. On an average 30 Percentage of the students are progressing to P.G. and other higher studies. At the beginning of the academic year it organizes meeting and collects valuable inputs regarding improvement in the infrastructure and administration of the College. The University results analysis for the last four academic years reflects both in subject wise and group wise, and in overall results the College establishes respectable record. The College has been occupying one of three top positions in the district for the last five years within Dr. B.R. Ambedkar University, Srikakulam purview. The institution has effective mechanism to seek and use data and feedback from its graduates and employers for the development of the institution. IQAC holds the responsibility of feedback analysis and action on it. The Students’ Union is an active and constructive body in the College managed democratically by the students themselves. They are organizing spectrum of activities.

Examination : The monitoring of the effective implementation of the evaluation reforms is done at various levels. At the departmental level, the In-Charge of the Departments ensures that the evaluation is carried out as per the University norms and the broader goals of the institution. At the institutional level, the Principal monitors the evaluation process through the Academic Council meeting. The academic calendar of the

The College motto reflects the spirit with which education is imparted to be imbibed by the students, kindling their minds with creativity, true to the import of the College motto” *“tejaswi naavadheetamastu”* (let the teacher and the taught grow and glow with enlightenment).

The College has the privilege of having renowned personalities hailing from this institution: Sri H.J. Dora IPS, member central Vigilance Commission, Govt. of India, Sri G. Yethirajula, High court judge, Sri Allamsetty Krishna Rao, IRAS, Accountant General, Sri R.K.R.Gonela, IAS, Commissioner of Land Revenue, A.P Sri T. Sitaram, former Minister, State Excise, A.P. are but a few of such luminaries. The College possesses a spacious building for the General Hostel, well managed by the students themselves.

The Central Library of the College is accommodated in the main building itself and enjoys the distinction of being the largest among the three districts of Zone-I. In addition to the conventional courses several Restructured courses have been introduced in B.A and B.Sc.

The Institution always encourages the faculty members to take up research work .The College has 13 Ph.D holders and 10 M.Phil holders. Another r09 faculty members are pursuing Ph.D., under FDP/part-time programme.

NAAC Accreditation: The College was accredited for 1st cycle with B ++ (CGPA 83.05) by NAAC in February, 2005 and re-accredited for 2nd cycle in August, 2011 with ‘B’ Grade (CGPA 2.87). College Undergone 3rd cycle accreditation on 25th & 26th Sep 2017 and graded with B ++ (CGPA 2.90).

Internal Quality Assurance Cell: As part of the post-accreditation activities, an Internal Quality Assurance Cell (IQAC) was formulated in 2005. It plans various mechanisms and internalizes various Quality measures. Various Activities and monitored guest lectures /extension lectures Workshops/seminars etc., every year. The Co-ordinator of (IQAC), prepares Annual Quality Assurance Report (AQAR) and submits to the NAAC Office, Bangalore at the end of every Academic year.


Jawahar Knowledge Centre: The Commissionarate of Collegiate Education has established a nodal Jawahar Knowledge Center in this institution with a view to create employability to young graduate students from Govt. Degree College in 2006. About 1746 students were trained for the last four years and 206 have got placements in various agencies.

District Resource Centre: The College was developed into a District resource centre (DRC) to network all the 12 Govt. Degree Colleges in the district. The executive committee with principal, Govt.
