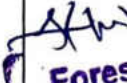

- ① Hatcheries are often perceived as safe places to incubate sea turtle nests. Depending on the hatchery location and construction, eggs may be protected from predators, poachers, tidal inundation and beach erosion.
- ② Incubation times varies with species, clutch size, and temperature and humidity in the nest.
- ③ The incubation time for most species is 45 to 70 days.
- ④ Research indicates the sex of an embryo is dependent on the temperature of the nest.
