

Jagananna Vidyaladeekana

Jagananna Vidyaladeekana is a program launched by the Government of Andhra Pradesh to encourage students studying in poor families to pursue higher education by reimbursing full fee which includes the tuition, special and examination fees. The scheme was established in February 2020, and the budget 2400 crores (per annum) and it benefits 11.82 lakh students from the poor households of the state. Chief Minister SS. Jagan Mohan Reddy officially launched by the scheme for the academic year 2021-22, ₹ 671.45 crores were deposited in the accounts of 10,98,439 beneficiaries in the first installment and ₹ 693.81 crores were deposited in the second installment benefiting 10.97 lakh students. The total of 4,979 crores were spent for the scheme. The scheme covers students pursuing 11th, Polytechnic, Degree, B.Tech, MBA, MCA, Pharmacy and other courses. They deposit money into the accounts of beneficiary mothers. State Government has made 75% attendance as mandatory to avail the scheme.

Scholarship Scheme

This scheme aims to improve the access, availability and quality of higher education, ensure continuous students in the stream of higher education & equip the students with essential skills. The students pursuing the following courses are eligible for B.Sc, B.Tech, B.E, B.A, B.Com, M.A, M.Sc, M.Tech, M.E, M.Phil, Ph.D. The students must be enrolled in the following colleges affiliated to any university/boards. The family annual income should not be more than Rs. 2.5 Lakh per annum. Beneficiaries should not only have resident below 10 acres of agricultural land below 25 acres for well land and agricultural land and under 25 acres. The beneficiaries should not own any other vehicles (car, taxi, auto, etc). The government employees are not eligible for the scheme and similarly the members of the family of their sponsor are not eligible. If any one in the family is availing pension then he or she not eligible for the scheme.







Government Assistance post degree abroad and Engineering, Medicine, P.H.D, Post involvement financial assistance of 15 lakh to SC, ST, Minority students and Rs 10 lakh to others for pursuing higher education like diploma. They recognized in 15 countries only for medicine courses in Philippines, Kazakhstan, China) including USA, Great Britain, Australia, Canada, Singapore, Germany, New Zealand, Sweden. This scheme is applicable for studying course in universities and one way air fare and visa fee nationalized banks at a fixed subsidy.





